Remember that summaries are always written in present tense!

- firstly / at first/ in the beginning/ ...
- then/ next/ in the following/ ...
- the author continues with
- lastly/ finally/ in the end/ ...

- ⑦ Check and edit your text. Use the following check-list for help.

My summary...

- ... is not longer than one third of the original text.
- ... has all the relevant information in it (everything you need to understand the author's main thesis and arguments).
- ... has no unnecessary details in it (examples, anecdotes, quotations,...).
- ... uses general terms for lists of specific items.
- ... doesn't have any quotes in it.
- ... doesn't have my personal opinions or interpretations in it.
- ... is easy to follow and understand (e.g. use linking words).
- ... uses correct language (spelling, grammar, etc.) --> present tense!
